# STAFF REPORTS:

#### Director Mills:

- Public Works staff has had only two positive COVID-19 cases. The social distancing, masking and sanitation programs seem to be working.
- > The second reading of the budget occurred this past Monday night. Alderman Janda made a motion to amend the budget and add another half million dollars to the Paving Contract if revenues suffice; this motion made it through the second reading and is moving forward.

Lift station repairs continue at Cordova Sewer Lift Station and the Western Gateway Sewer Extension is almost complete.

# **COMMISSION MEMBER REPORTS:**

### Linda Kaplan:

Article <u>Turning Manure into Money</u> from the Washington Post shares how in Massachusetts, a farmer created a bio-digester to turn manure into methane gas which can be used for fuel or electricity. "Trapping methane, processing it and burning it for energy or selling it to the electric grid is a way to remove it from the atmosphere. It turns manure — a 1,400-pound dairy cow produces nearly 54,000 pounds of it annually — into money."

#### Francoise Mireles:

- Article Food Waste in America in 2020 The United States is the global leader in food waste, with Americans discarding nearly 40 million tons of food every year. That's 80 billion pounds of food and equates to more than \$161 billion, approximately 219 pounds of waste per person or \$1,600 per family and 30-40 percent of the US food supply. Every year in the U.S. 80 billion pounds of food is thrown away which is the equivalent of 1,000 Empire State Buildings.
- Multiple states are implementing initiatives to reduce food waste; Three years ago Tennessee started a task force to study food waste, with TDEC heading it up but not many statistics or information about the effort is available on the State's website. Madison, Wisconsin implemented an initiative called "The One Pound Diet" promoting each household reducing food waste one pound per week. The World Wildlife Federation calculated that the world production of wasted food would be the equivalent of the greenhouse emissions of 37 million cars.

### Paul Mosteller:

What will out world be like in 50 years? America's capitalist system, the free enterprise system will take care of global warming and climate change through technology; not only is America doing this but the whole world. Europeans no longer manufacture combustion engines, everything is electronic and more and more people are purchasing those. The domino effect of this is more electric cars on the road, less need for petroleum, less need for convenience stores, less need for fracking or pulling anything from the ground; subsequently the environment will start healing itself and cleaning itself up.

### Scott Schoefernacker:

University of Memphis and their work on Well Head Protection for the City of Germantown - Models are created based on aquifer characteristics to produce well head protection zones. One zone is directly around the well head, approximately 250-300 feet around, and zone 2 is a lot larger; the zones are based on pumping rates. Well head protection plans have to be created every three years and the last was created in 2019. Every year windshield surveys are done of the well field areas looking for potential contaminate sources; there are 206 locations total, 168 at the Southern Ave well field and 38 locations at Johnson Road. These locations consist mainly of doctors' offices and commercial businesses and of the 206, only 20% are regulated by the EPA. The main concerns are underground storage tanks, such as gas stations, and dry cleaners. Germantown's contaminate sources are few and confinement is good. Unconfined areas in the neighboring eastern part of Shelby County are being monitored by the EPA and TDEC.
